## A WORD FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

Biking through England, my companion and I stopped in the grassy center of a busy roundabout to check our position and plan our route. We had an assortment of maps: the overview of the whole country, the middle view, and the local view, so detailed even farm buildings showed up as tiny squares. We poured over the maps at length until, at last, my co-rider folded them all up, stuffed them away, and hopped back on the bike, crying, "OHH-KAY! Which way do we go?"



These days, I sometimes feel like I'm in the middle of a traffic roundabout, or maybe even the center of the whirling cosmos. So much is happening all around me and yet I feel curiously immobile, uncertain about which path to take next. Energy is limited; where is it best spent?

If we, as a congregation, accept the challenge and invitation of seriously engaging with entrenched racism in our culture, we can choose from a number of options:

- Locally: the Diversity Council, during our training, suggested a "Commitment to Action to End Racism." If we choose to sign on, we would join a multitude of local organizations, from the Rochester Public Library to Channel One to the Mayo Clinic - though, curiously, few churches. We would commit to "Listen, Learn, and Act" with other leaders of the community. Dee Sabol, director of Diversity Council, emphasizes the "action" piece. <http://www.cpcrochester.org/wordpress/wp-content/uploads/2020/08/For-Signature-Consortium-Racial-Justice-Commitment-to-Action.pdf>
- The Presbytery is coordinating a year-long spiritual pilgrimage with other Presbyterians, to examine the history of racism in Minnesota and Western Wisconsin. This journey, which combines individual study with on-line learning and sharing, looks at the middle view - not just southeastern Minnesota, but the entire region. I have registered for this, so you are likely to get the trickle-down from me in any case. (Registration deadline was 8/28.) <https://anti-racism-ptca.weebly.com/2020-2021-spiritual-pilgrimage.html>
- Nationally, we can join as a congregation the PC(USA) Matthew 25 project, which actually has three areas of emphasis: 1) building congregational vitality; 2) dismantling structural racism, and 3), eradicating systemic poverty. Congregations can choose to be part of any or all of the areas. I've attended one hour-long virtual event on ending racism with congregational leaders from across the country and it was *powerful!* Another one-hour virtual event is scheduled for September 16. What I love about all three of these options is that each holds us accountable to our professed values and our cherished ideals. The truth that we are part of a larger fabric of committed and faithful people becomes tangible reality.

Of course, it may be that we need a little more time in the roundabout to get our bearings. The whirl of events can be overwhelming. We may choose a completely different path. As always, I welcome your feedback! It's your church! Which way do we go?

## A NOTE OF THANKS

## BOOK DISCUSSION GROUP

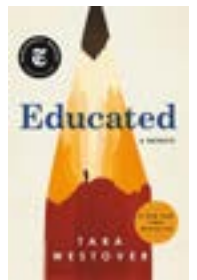
Our group is beginning again, but not around the table in the Library. This is how Margaret predicts our first book group of the year will go. After Church on your own computer or telephone, you can imagine

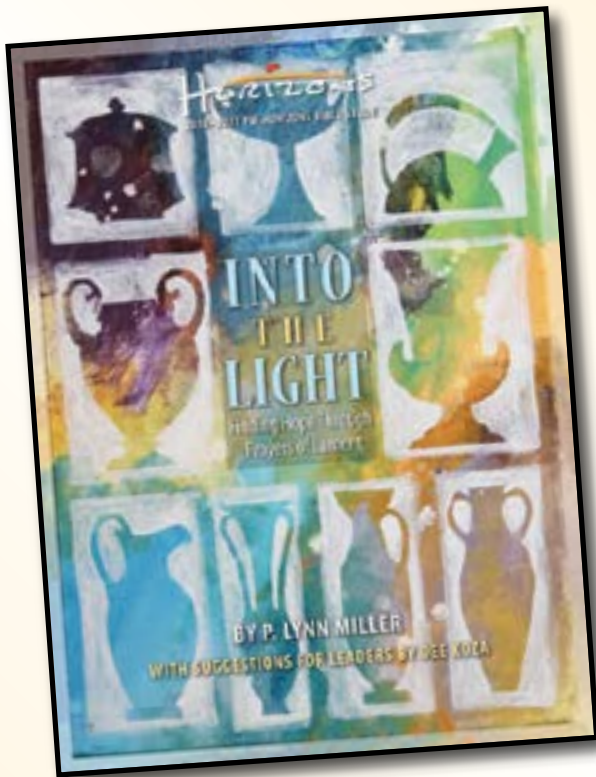
### **Pastor Jan is leading the PW Bible Study this fall!**

## Introducing the 2020–2021 PW/*Horizons* Bible Study!



In this nine-lesson study, Lynn Miller revives lament as a proper theological response to the difficult situations of our world. One of the foundational points of the study is that, in scripture, lament usually leads to hope. After crying out to God, the one who laments remembers God. And while that doesn't fix things in the moment—the injustice, the loss, still exists—the lamenter is strengthened to face the world and to hope. And for us as Christians, hope is not just an emotional response or an attitude of pie in the sky. Hope implies movement: both God's inherent movement toward justice and our movement toward God. Recovering lament may be one of the church's most timely gifts to the world.

### About the authors



**Lynn Miller**, author and artist, is a minister of Word and Sacrament in the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.). She received her MDiv from Union Presbyterian Seminary (Richmond, Virginia) and the DMin from Pittsburgh Theological Seminary,

in conjunction with the University of Aberdeen (Scotland). She has served as a workshop leader, graphic designer, and keynote speaker for conferences and gatherings on theology, worship, spirituality, education, and the arts. She provided the suggestions for leaders for the 2016–2017 PW/*Horizons* Bible study, *Who Is Jesus? What a Difference a Lens Makes* by Judy Yates Siker. Lynn has been a practicing artist for 25 years. She holds undergraduate and graduate degrees in fine arts and art history. Her work is in private and church collections throughout the U.S.


national staff positions and in seven churches as an educator. Presently, Dee serves as pastor of Geneva Presbyterian Church in Geneva, Alabama.

### SAVE THE DATES!

The dates and times for a virtual Stated Meeting of the Presbytery have been set. Yes, you read that correctly: dateS and timeS and Virtual. This meeting will involve several opportunities for our presbytery:

- The Meeting will take place over 2 days, in short segments, to enhance accessibility so that more presbyters will be able to participate;
- The Meeting will be held virtually, via ZOOM, in recognition that gathering in-person for a meeting is not safe for our members due to COVID;
- The Meeting will place emphasis on consensus-building, not debate and division;
- There will be Intentional opportunities both before and during the meeting for the body to shape the discussion;
- There will be opportunities after the meeting to share your comments about how we did and share your suggestions for the next Stated Meetings.

### SAVE THESE DATES:

**Thursday, October 1, 2020, time to be determined:** "ZOOM Rehearsal" for all presbyters who wish to check out the technology in advance of the meeting.

**Friday, October 2, 2020, 4:00 pm to 5:00 pm:** Stated Meeting, Chapter 1. The agenda for this first part of the Stated Meeting will include a time of centering, a time for checking in/speaking out, and action on the Consent Agenda.

**Saturday, October 3, 2020, 10:00 am to 11:30 am:** Stated Meeting, Chapter 2. The agenda for this portion of the Stated Meeting will include action on individual business items, election of committee members and chairs, and election and installation of officers.

**Tuesday, October 6, 2020, time to be determined:** "How Did We Do?" This is your chance to comment on, respond to, and debrief the Stated Meeting, and help shape our next Stated Meetings.
