A WORD FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

We didn't intend to adopt a special needs dog. We didn't even know she had special needs when we chose her (or she chose us) at Paws and Claws five and a half years ago. But it seems every year, our Missy (aka "Mystery") has encountered a new health crisis. Some have brought her to the brink of death, but she's always edged her way back. This year, we're not sure she has the strength or the will to do that. We're growing reconciled to the obvious: she's nearing the end of her days.

You know how it feels, don't you? In the recent past, some of us have said goodbye to much loved companions, after quick or prolonged illness, or suddenly, by accidental death. Some people have chosen to share their grief, others have chosen to keep it close and private. We all mourn in our own way, and that's as it should be.

And it's right that we mourn. Our pets are companions more constant than any except our immediate family; they never judge us; they stand in as therapists through the dark days of divorce, or frightening diagnoses, or our own physical decline. They ask so little and give so much.

And they are beloved by God, their Maker. No one expressed this better than St. Francis of Assisi, who called all creatures his brothers

and sisters. Many churches offer a "Pet Blessing" service around October 4, on the Feast of St. Francis, and we might consider this, too, in some post-COVID future, though in my experience, cats are not best pleased to be asked to worship next to dogs, nor rats and gerbils with cats. (A blessing for animals that you can use at home is included elsewhere in this newsletter.)

But we need not limit the blessing of our animal friends to a narrow window in early October. I have been known to make house calls to bless sick and dying pets, and have conducted more than one memorial service for beloved companions.

And we need not limit our prayer to domestic pets. To ask for God's blessing on animals everywhere reminds us of the suffering of those trapped, abandoned, or dying in violent weather events,

destructive wildfires, or warfare. We remember that we, too, are animals, and part of God's vast and splendid world, with this difference: we have the privilege and responsibility of caring for the rest of it. Thanks be to God.

P.S. As this newsletter goes to print, Missy Mystery is still hanging onto life with all four paws. We're thinking of renaming her Lazarina Felina, because of her repeated deefiance of death.







A Prayer to Use in Your Home

A prayer of blessing for the animals

In early October, many Christians celebrate the Feast of St. Francis by gathering for a blessing of the animals. In former times, for agricultural communities this would include the work horses and other livestock that supplied so many needs. Today, the brief service is mostly for pet owners: "no pet too large, too small, too hairy, or too scaly," as one church used to say.

If you like this idea, here is a prayer of blessing you may use. If you pray it with your own companion animals, hold your right hand over their head and call them by name, using their preferred pronoun.

Blessed are you, Beloved God, maker of all living creatures. You called forth fish in the sea, birds in the air, and animals on the land. You inspired St. Francis to call all of them his brothers and sisters. We ask you to bless them [or use proper name] now.

By the power of your love, enable them to live according to your plan.

May our relationship with them mirror your love,
and our care be an example of your bountiful mercy.

Grant to all animals, wild or tame, health and peace,
and when the time comes for them to leave this life,
may it be with dignity and without suffering.

May we always praise you for all your beauty in creation.
Blessed are you, Beloved God, in all your creatures! Amen.

FINANCE AND STEWARDSHIP





Sometimes it feels like the world is coming at us so quickly that we don't know which way to turn, where to look, what to do next. In a chaotic world, we find strength in knowing that God is always near. That is that is a cause for gratefulness for the *Season of Peace* right now, which culminates with the Peace & Global Witness Offering on World Communion Sunday. The ministries of peacemaking and reconciliation witness to the Prince of Peace. It is good to be reminded that, with all the discord, pain and conflict in communities and in the world, God promises harmony and responds to violence with reconciliation and peace.

The Peace & Global Witness Offering draws
Presbyterians together and provides education
and exposure to those who show how to do this
work well. It has helped support church partners
in Lebanon as they recover emotionally from
the trauma after a bombing in Beirut. It helped
congregations begin to address the growing
mental health crisis and the increase in number
of suicides in their communities. And the whole
church joined together, through this Offering,
to lead a Peacemaking Travel Study to the U.S.Mexico border, where participants got a greater
understanding of the difficult life for many people



in Central America and Mexico fleeing from poverty and violence

Every level of society is in need of Christ's peace — at all times, in all ways. From CPC, where 25% will be retained of this Offering to support the Diversity Council and its important role in our community; to the region, where 25% is retained by the Presbytery of the Twin Cities Area to support peacemaking efforts being pursued, together with neighboring congregations; and to the ends of the earth, where the remaining 50% is deployed by the Presbyterian Mission Agency to join the peacemaking efforts of church partners all over the globe.

As a community of faith, it is important to deepen the commitment to peacemaking so that it becomes a visible and profound witness.
