

GOSPEL READING John 11:32-44

Grief and love go hand in hand; they are part of life, but sorrow does not destroy us. By faith, we are unbound not only from death, but from the fear of death that paralyzes our lives.

When Mary came where Jesus was and saw him, she knelt at his feet and said to him, "Lord, if you had been here, my brother would not have died." When Jesus saw her weeping, and the Jews who came with her also weeping, he was greatly disturbed in spirit and deeply moved. He said, "Where have you laid him?" They said to him, "Lord, come and see." Jesus began to weep. So the Jews said, "See how he loved him!" But some of them said, "Could not he who opened the eyes of the blind man have kept this man from dying?" Then Jesus, again greatly disturbed, came to the tomb. It was a cave, and a stone was lying against it. Jesus said, "Take away the stone." Martha, the sister of the dead man, said to him, "Lord, already there is a stench because he has been dead four days." Jesus said to her, "Did I not tell you that if you believed, you would see the glory of God?" So they took away the stone. And Jesus looked upward and said, "Father, I thank you for having heard me. I knew that you always hear me, but I have said this for the sake of the crowd standing here, so that they may believe that you sent me." When he had said this, he cried with a loud voice, "Lazarus, come out!" The dead man came out, his hands

and feet bound with strips of cloth, and his face wrapped in a cloth. Jesus said to them, "Unbind him, and let him go."

Keep these words in your heart. The Lord is our God, the Lord alone.

Lift up your hearts!


We lift them to the One who gives us life.

and forgive us our debts, as we forgive our debtors;


and let us not be led into temptation, but deliver us from evil.

After this I looked, and behold, a great multitude which no one could number, from every nation, from all tribes and peoples and tongues, crying out with a loud voice:


