A WORD FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

"O come, let us adore him," as we sang on Christmas Eve, as we sing every Christmas. This is not puppy-cute "adorable," but awe-infused adoration of God who *opens in* our lives, and *opens up* our lives not only at Christmas but all year long. We worship not just on Sundays, but every day that we celebrate God at work in us.

But what does it mean to worship God, the God we see and know in Jesus Christ? Sunday morning gatherings are precious to many of us, forgettable to others, to some a



boring but inevitable part of the week. Some prefer to give it a miss and worship in nature. But even for those whose week feels incomplete without a Sunday service, it's rare to feel the electrifying sense of God absolutely present and powerful. The writer Annie Dillard said authentic worship should require us all to strap on crash helmets. That's how thrilling worship should be. (Or something along those lines.)

Sometime in early 2023, we as a congregation will begin talking about what would make worship more meaningful. Before that happens, can I ask you to ponder something written by Episcopal priest Nontombi Naomi Tutu? "Worship of God is . . . all about how we treat our neighbor, how we deal with the less fortunate, what we do to or for the widow and orphan, and how we treat the stranger in our midst. I have seen it in the small parish of St. Thomas, Kagiso, South Africa. When we visited some years ago, the rector at the time, Xolani Dlwati, told us, 'We do not do outreach. Everything we do is worship'. This congregation, comprised of predominantly poor families, fed lunch to children in the neighborhood school; bought school books, shoes, and uniforms for children in the community; stood as guardians for families of child-headed households; and made sure that those dying from AIDS had their homes cleaned, were eating healthy food, and knew they were loved. There was no fancy church sanctuary, no glamorous life for the rector, just worship of God that showed, through their caring, what Christianity is all about."

In that sense, the most exciting worship we have experienced this year has been through our relationships with Gage East, LifeGate Services, and the Village Community Garden. When we presented the \$40,000 check from Margaret's bequest to the Women's Shelter for the purchase of a safe, reliable van, they jumped for joy and cried tears of happiness. Gage East was similarly touched by the smaller gift of \$5000. This brings joy to others, and returns joy to us, and glorifies God above all. That is our worship.

While our primary goal was simply to offer help where it was most immediately needed and had the most direct impact, it appears that we may also win some media attention for this. That's OK. It's good for people to know that this is how we worship a God of love and abundance.

We have five months in which to build on our already firm foundation in preparation for a new pastor, so let's get going! We have a lot of worshiping to do!


