



GOSPEL READING

Matthew 2:1-12

In the time of King Herod, after Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea, wise men from the East came to Jerusalem, asking, 'Where is the child who has been born king of the Jews? For we observed his star at its rising, and have come to pay him homage.' When King Herod heard this, he was frightened, and all Jerusalem with him; and calling together all the chief priests and scribes of the people, he inquired of them where the Messiah was to be born. They told him, 'In Bethlehem of Judea; for so it has been written by the prophet:

"And you, Bethlehem, in the land of Judah, are by no means least among the rulers of Judah; for from you shall come a ruler who is to shepherd my people Israel." '

Then Herod secretly called for the wise men and learned from them the exact time when the star had appeared. Then he sent them to Bethlehem, saying, 'Go and search diligently for the child; and when you have found him, bring me word so that I may also go and pay him homage.' When they had heard the king, they set out; and there, ahead of them, went the star that they had seen at its rising, until it stopped over the place where the child was. When they saw that the star had stopped, they were overwhelmed with joy. On entering the house, they saw the child with Mary his mother; and they knelt down and paid him homage. Then, opening their treasure-chests, they offered him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. And having been warned in a dream not to return to Herod, they left for their own country by another road.

MEDITATION ON STAR WORDS

The season of Epiphany holds the time between Christmas and Lent. Traditionally, the visit of foreign dignitaries to worship the baby Jesus symbolizes the light of Christ revealed to the greater world. But an epiphany can be any realization that results in a new and deeper understanding. Like those who paid attention to the Star of Bethlehem, many Christians observe Epiphany with Star Words, words given to each person to ponder through the coming year. Choose a Star Word as the basket is passed. We'll meditate on them together for a few minutes. Take your Star Word home and place it somewhere that you will see it every day. On Epiphany of 2024, take time to remember and perhaps share how your Star Word has helped guide you through the year.

Margaret Nelson, longtime member and supporter of the church. The money will be used to purchase a van to transport the shelter's clients and to replace another vehicle.

Jeannie Thompson, director of youth programming and community outreach at the women's shelter, will speak about the Women's Shelter & Support Center's goals at the church, 3705 Fairway Place NW in Rochester, at 10:30 a.m. Sunday, Jan. 15. The event is open to the public and will follow the worship service.

Jeannie's background is in mental health nursing, working in adolescent mental health and clinical psychology. Jeannie began volunteering at a domestic violence center in North Iowa. She eventually went on staff with that agency. She has been an advocate for victims and survivors of domestic violence and sexual assault for more than 30 years. She is a foster/adoptive parent, has four children, five grandchildren, one great-grandchild and two cats, Faith & Hope. (Hope is the naughty one.)
