A WORD FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

"I keep having these irresistible impulses to speak the truth to political leaders."

Have you had those urges yourself? Whatever side of the aisle you shop on, the truth often seems faded, frayed, or falsified entirely. "How could we have come to such a pass?" I hear people lamenting. I lament myself.



That's why I found it strangely comforting to encounter the words above, quoted in a recent meditation by Richard Rohr. The words are not those of a disgruntled 21st observer century. They were written by a 16th Century Spanish mystic, Teresa of Ávila. Truth was apparently as rare in public spaces then as it remains today, and politics the same mish-mash of good intentions, noble and nefarious deeds, and misdirection. "What atrocities could be avoided," Teresa said, if world leaders could be brought to an understanding of the truth rather than simply grasping at power.

The Bible had a lot to say about truth and its absence. Jeremiah, whose prophetic ministry predated Teresa's by 2000 years, was told by God, "Run to and fro through the streets of Jerusalem, look around and take note! Search its squares and see if you can find one person who acts justly and seeks truth." According to the Psalms, truth is seen as a guide for our actions and the measure of our lives. Jesus referred to himself as "the way, the truth, and the life" (John 14:6). God and truth are indivisible.

John 9, our gospel story from a recent Sunday, presents a sometimes hilarious picture of regular folks and religious leaders wrangling among themselves over the case of the man born blind but given sight by Jesus. Ironically, in their so-called quest for truth they discount the testimony of the one person who can accurately describe what happened: the man who now can see. Their minds were made up. Both Jesus and the man he healed were labeled guilty, sinners, sinister characters.

The newly-sighted man meets Jesus again at the end of the narrative. This time he sees also with his heart and spirit, and recognizes Jesus as the Son of God, the Messiah. No doubt remains for him.

I wish I could say that I have a firm grasp of The Truth at all times, but the real truth is that I have my own points of view, and any point of view is also a point of blindness. Still, in faithfulness, I can seek the whole picture as well as my corner of it. I can question anything that doesn't seem consistent with the Gospel message of peace, forgiveness, love and compassion.

In faithfulness, I can pray with St. Teresa, "God, please help world leaders understand the magnitude of their responsibilities.... I sincerely pray for our leaders, and I would like to be of some help to them.... Here is my life. Here is my honor. Here is my will. I give them all to you. I am yours. Use me as you will."

In faithfulness, when I am convinced that God has shown me the truth in the light of Christ, I will not be afraid to speak that truth to power. May we all seek, question, and pray with such desire in our hearts, and may we all be unafraid to speak when the Spirit moves.

Thanks be to God!

In Isaiah 58, the prophet exclaims, "Your ancient ruins shall be rebuilt; you shall raise up the foundations of many generations; you shall be called the repairer of the breach, the restorer of streets to live in" (Isaiah 58:12). As the people of Israel returned from the cloud of exile and struggled to rebuild their lives, Isaiah questioned their efforts: [Are you not called] "to share your bread with the hungry, and bring the homeless poor into your house; when you see the naked, to cover them?" (Isaiah 58:7).


Then in Matthew 25, we hear Jesus calling to us, "For I was hungry and you gave me food ... I was a stranger and you welcomed me, I was naked and you gave me clothing. ... As you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me" (Matthew 25:35-40).

Isaiah and Jesus are making an important theological point: Faithfulness to God leads to fixing things that are broken — broken lives, broken spirits, broken hearts, broken relationships, and broken breaches of faith and trust.



AROUND THE COMMUNITY... AT CPC



CPC will host a conversation with Sarah Augustine, co-founder and Director of the Dismantling the Doctrine of Discovery Coalition on Monday, April 17, from 3-5 pm.

The Doctrine of Discovery refers to a principle in public international law under which, when a nation "discovers" land, it acquires rights on that land. In fact, the doctrine was used to legitimize the colonization and theft of already inhabited lands outside of Europe.

The event was arranged by allies supporting Makoce Ikikcupi (Land Recovery) whose goal is the return of land to Indigenous people of

Minnesota. This is accomplished through donations and other means of buying back property for which they were never compensated by the US government.

Augustine is a Tewa (Pueblo) descendant who has represented the interests of vulnerable Indigenous people around the world to their own governments, the UN, the World Health Organization, and other international bodies. She has taught in several universities, and serves on multiple boards enabling vulnerable people to speak for themselves.

An Anabaptist, Augustine is the author of *The Land Is Not Empty: Following Jesus in Dismantling the Doctrine of Discovery* (Herald Press, 2021.

The congregation is welcome to attend the event. Coffee and refreshments will be served. Preregistration is not required, but to assure adequate seating is provided, please inform Pastor Jan if you wish to attend.
