A WORD FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

Seeking: what Christians are all about. Well, and finding, too. "Seek and you will find," Jesus counsels. Sometimes what we seek appears quickly and clearly; more often we have to live the questions to live into the answers, as the poet Rilke put it. "Be patient toward all that is unresolved in your heart."

Seeking is our theme in Lent, but also our task for the next few months. We seek ways to invest and use Margaret's marvelous gift to us. We seek people to fill the staff positions that will be vacant in June, not just the pastor's role but the irreplaceable Meg, our music



director for the last nine years. We seek help from the Presbytery in defining who we are right now, and in locating good candidates who will fit the CPC style and goals. We seek ways to continue to be active and resourceful in engaging the needs of the Rochester community and beyond.

Bob and I returned this week from a three-week vacation to the Southwest with other family members. We went seeking warmth, sunshine, and time with family. We found all three, and more. Like many of you, we had curtailed travel plans through most of COVID. Stretching our muscles outside the usual safe haunts feels like a miracle. Gathering indoors with people we love feels doubly precious. Walking casually into a restaurant, ordering and being served by unmasked women and men presents pure luxury on a platter.

Our last in-person-only worship took place three years ago on March 15, 2020, as the pandemic loomed. Clueless as we were then, we thought we might suspend meeting at church for a couple of weeks, a month or two at most. Scientists and health care professionals feverishly sought knowledge, effective vaccines, or any solid evidence to keep people safer. Meanwhile, panicked people went in search of toilet paper and hand sanitizer, which had vanished from every retail shelf. Which was worse, the anticipation of the lockdown, or the reality?

What we don't know is always scary in the veiled future, but less so in hindsight. One of the Psalms' recurring messages tells us: Do you worry about what's to come? Then look to the past. When have you felt abandoned, or cast down? How were you nourished and held, even through the most trying times? Did you sometimes turn from God in frustration? One answer is simply to live in the present, in the Presence of God's love.

Part of our Sunday worship through Lent will be sharing our honest questions as we reach for deeper faith. Let your family of faith in on the secret of what you are searching for. You will be invited to share your doubts and concerns, your queries and your quests with others. We will knock together on the door of the future.

God's answer to you when you just don't know is to love you more. Only to love you more. Let that always be the answer you seek. May that always be the assurance you find.


A GLIMPSE OF THE ANNUAL MEETING AND SESSION

Highlights of the annual meeting

On Sunday, January 22, a sizable group of members gathered onsite and online to review the achievements of the year past and look ahead to new developments.

A budget of \$154,766.42 was passed, reflecting the slightly smaller pledged giving base this year.

Our membership was recorded as seventy-four. The decrease reflects the Clerk of Session and Session's good work in contacting members who have moved or are no longer active and removing them from the official rolls.



Another amendment reduced the number of annual Session meetings from ten to six, with the option for more as needed. Committees, too, will be able to meet only as needed and instead focus energies on accomplishing tasks.

The meeting concluded in just one hour. Thanks to all for participating and expediting the work!

On Sunday, February 19th, the Elders, Deacons and other Lay Leaders were installed into office. Lyal Powell was ordained as a Ruling Elder. Blessings on all of the CPC Leadership Team!

The Gage East library grows from the ground up

As the 3M committee (Margaret's Mission Money) gathered funding proposals for a tithe, or 10%, of Margaret's bequest, one project we regretted not being able to support was the rebuilding of the library at Gage East Apartments. A fire in the room above had ruined the books and shelves with water, soot, and smoke.



You rose to the challenge anyway, donating \$500 as individuals and through the Mission Committee for the purchase of appropriate books. A further \$620 was allocated from year-end Mission Giving for shelves to fit the designated space.

The library is growing! Almost five hundred new and used books and child-friendly DVDs have been purchased. Most of the books are for preschool to young adult readers, with a few for adult readers, also. Some still await cataloging on Pastor Jan's dining room table. About eight boxes of materials have already been recorded.

Meanwhile, a local craftsperson, Melvin Tyree, was engaged to design and build the shelves according to Gage East's specifications. With the support (and some borrowed tools) of woodworker Mark Neville, Mel undertook the project in Jan and Bob's garage.

With Gage East, we look forward to a grand opening for the library sometime later this spring. Once the library is up and running, Melissa Stortz, family support coordinator, will be seeking volunteers to tutor children a couple of hours one or two days a week, probably Tuesdays and Thursdays after school.

Stay alert for other volunteer opportunities as well, possibly including an Easter egg hunt, an Earth Day clean-up contest, or a Planting Party. And, of course, the Summer Party with the usual outdoor festivities (date TBD).




CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Note: you'll be asked if you are a student (s) or a parent (p). Choose either one. The application was designed for schools, but will work for our purposes.


