A WORD FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

Try the 100-year plan

Sarah Augustine, co-founder and executive director of the Dismantling the Doctrine of Discovery Coalition, has a plan in mind to overturn the effects of that misguided dictum of 1493. That's the one Pope Alexander VI issued not long after Columbus "discovered" North America, which was actually inhabited by at least 95 million people. To be fair, he merely refined on similar



declarations of Pope Urban II in 1095 and Pope Nicholas V in 1452. The Popes gave explorers *carte blanche* in claiming any land previously unknown to Europeans for their God and country, so they could drain them of resources.

The same decree assured the Portuguese that they were doing God's will in siphoning Africans off their homelands and enslaving them to labor until dead (usually about 8 years) in the "New World" (again, not new to those who had lived there for millennia). What a tangled web this doctrine has woven, working its way into almost every global social structure of the last 1000 years. Effects are too complex to think of for long without having to lie down with a headache.

But, as I said, Sarah Augustine has a plan in mind as comprehensive and brilliant as the Doctrine of Discovery itself. On Monday, April 17, she shared it with Presbyterians, Quakers, and Mennonites here at CPC. Her plan involves seizing openings on every level, from personal to political to judicial, truth-telling, opening history to honest scrutiny, and winning trust. But, as she pointed out, you can't turn around trends of this magnitude overnight. Hence, the 100-year plan. Those who labor today merely do so to pass a brighter torch to the next generations than the one they were handed.

In our swiftly evolving world, where the current century is likely to see more changes than we can readily imagine, the prospect of a 100-year plan is a little dizzying. But when I consider how Indigenous people somehow survived the ethnic cleansing that accompanied colonization, I realize that they may be onto something. It's like the Seventh Generation Principle, based on a Haudenosaunee (Iroquois) philosophy dating probably from a timeframe similar to that of the Doctrine of Discovery. This maintains that the decisions we make today should result in a sustainable world seven generations into the future.

In that light, my few years with you resemble a fraction of a nano-second. Yet as Indigenous people know well, we work not to see the culmination of our plans but rather to set a truer course for those who come after us. I think of this as we bend our energies toward seeking new leadership. Shall we make decisions only in light of the next few months or years, or can we make them on the 100-year plan? Certainly the disciples in year 33 couldn't conceive of their teacher's mission still blossoming 2000 years in the future. But thanks to their devotion, their faith, and their unremitting commitment to the task Jesus delegated to them, here we are. Two thousand years is a bit beyond my comprehension. But a 100-year plan—why not?


She also has performed the typical duties of a pastor: leading worship services, teaching PW Bible studies, moderating session, providing pastoral care and performing the sacraments.

She also participates in the Land Recovery Project, whose goal is to return land to Minnesota's Indigenous people. She also has done advocacy work for the Quakers in Washington.

Jan is eager to have more time for biking, playing piano, reading and training her new dog, April. We

Pentecost is one of my favorite holy days of the church year. It's one of few days where pastors get to wear red stoles in the life of the church. Pentecost is also commonly referred to as "the Birthday of the Church."

In Acts 1:8, just before Jesus ascends to the heavens, he commissions the eleven, "Rather, you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you, and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, in all Judea and Samaria, and to the end of the earth."


God is making a power theological point right here: Jesus leaves and the church is born. The church is the visible body of Jesus Christ alive and at work in the world today.

The Apostle Paul underscores this important teaching. After talking about Christ's Ascension, he wrote: "[God] gave some apostles, some prophets, some evangelists, and some pastors and teachers. [God's] purpose was to equip God's people for the work of serving and building up the body of Christ" (Ephesians 4:11–12, CEB). We are the church, TOGETHER!

The Pentecost Offering supports ministries with children, youth and young adults in our community, across the nation and around our world. 


Gage East Library!


